We are a community of interest with unique needs that deserves elected officials that are culturally competent and responsive to our needs when we ask for help. For example, there was a time, and even now, when the neighborhood needed an elected official to stand by the side of the community in order to resist the development of luxury towers currently being constructed. Instead, they turned a blind eye to protect themselves from the backlash from the richer class and in return leaving the neighborhood that they are supposed to represent to worsen. Issues unique to our community include gentrification - long-time residents are being pushed out of their homes due to increasing rent prices and exacerbating the housing problem. Some other issues are the lack of language access, the decaying air quality, and the overflow of trash on the streets. I point these issues out to highlight the complexity of this neighborhood and to reaffirm the importance of keeping Chinatown and the Lower East Side together so that our community members can have a voice.
