Good afternoon to all members of the Commission who are present today,

My name is Wali Ullah and I'm a livelong resident of Pelham Gardens in The Bronx. I was born and raised in the Bronx.

For nearly a century, the Bronx has served as a melting pot of diverse cultures and ethnicities, much similar to its sibling boroughs. Traditionally these have included European Jews, Italian-Americans, Irish-Americans, Latin-Americans, Puerto Ricans, and African-Americans. Over the past 25 years, however, our borough continues to diversify, adding Bengali, Dominican, Albanian, Pakistani, Yemeni, and Indo/Afro-Caribbean, and West African immigrants and families to its ever-burgeoning melting pot of diversity. Though many of the proposed Congressional, Senate, and Assembly district boundaries reflect shifting demographics well enough already, I would like to propose a different district map for one of the Senate districts which is situated within the heart of Parkchester. For too long, Parkchester has been gerrymandered strangely in a fashion that the entire neighborhood itself is split into three different Senate districts, currently Districts 32, 33, and 34.

What I would like to propose is that one of the Senate districts in Parkchester, which shares a large population of Asian-Americans (specifically Bengali Americans) and Hispanics, be expanded into the Little Yemen portion of the Van Nest neighborhood as well as Norwood, which shares a growing population of Bengali Americans as well. I believe these boundaries, though different from the ones proposed by the IRC, will allow the Bronx to better reflect its growing Muslim and Asian-American populations, as well as provide better government support and resources to those ethnic groups, which are predominantly first-generation families. Such support can look like increasing language and social service support to Bengali and Arabic speaking Bronxites in the district as well as the borough by and large.
